


Buddy

2021 Animal Numbers

RCHS cared for 1,071 homeless animals last year:

241 dogs and puppies
785 cats and kittens
45 small animals (including rabbits, birds, guinea pigs, and other small animals)

172 animals were transferred in from other shelters in overpopulated parts of the country: 89 dogs and puppies 83 cats and kittens 821 animals found their forever homes!
159 dogs and puppies
624 cats and kittens
38 small animals

67% Of Stray Dogs 11% Of Stray Cats

were reunited with their owners

Community Programs

SPAY THE MOM PROGRAM

If you're a Rutland County resident, you can bring any mom cat or dog and all her kittens or puppies to us at no charge. In exchange, the Humane Society will "Spay the Mom" administer rabies and distemper vaccines, and return her to you at no cost. The kittens and puppies will be adopted into loving new homes after being spayed and neutered.



FERAL CAT PROGRAM

RCHS assists people who are caring for stray, feral and other loosely owned cats in Rutland County. We will also provide support of Rutland County residents who employ TNR to manage local feral cat populations. Young kittens may be adopted into homes and the other healthy cats too wild to be adopted are returned to their familiar habitat under the lifelong care of volunteers.



HAVE-A-HEART TRAP LOAN PROGRAM

RCHS has a variety of sizes of Have-A-Heart traps which can be loaned out to Rutland County residents. We have traps for small animals, traps for cats and fat cats and three different size traps for dogs.

COMMUNITY PET FOOD PROGRAM

RCHS is so appreciative of the donations made to the shelter from our compassionate and caring community. If pet food and supplies are donated that we cannot use, we work with many of the food shelves in Rutland County to distribute food and supplies to them. When we have extra, we call the food shelves who come to RCHS and pick it up. If you need pet food, please visit your local food shelf. Please consider making a donation of pet food to your local food shelf to help those who need it.

SHELTER TOURS

HUMANE EDUCATION

Educating our community about humane treatment of animals, what RCHS does, our programs and many other topics is important to us. If you have a group of students, scouts, campers, staff, seniors and more, we would love to come talk about RCHS and how we help the animals and people in Rutland County.

ANIMAL SURRENDERS

The Rutland County Humane Society accepts all owned domestic animals who are surrendered to us by residents of Rutland County without fee or discrimination based on potential adoptability. In 2021, 594 animals were surrendered to RCHS by their owners.

LOST & FOUND PETS

RCHS accepts stray domestic animals that are brought to us by citizens or designated Animal Control Officers. All stray animals will be held at the shelter for 5 business days to enable any possible owners to reclaim their animal. In 2021, 305 stray animals were brought to RCHS.



ANIMAL CRUELTY AND NEGLECT

RCHS proudly works as a partner with Rutland County law enforcement on situations involving animal neglect and abuse. RCHS has no law enforcement authority or the resources available to investigate concerns.
