We made a difference for 1,074 animals who needed us in 2022. Three hundred fifty-eight stray animals found warmth and love while waiting for their owners to find them. We made a difference for them. Four hundred eighty-two animals came to us because their owners were no



longer able to care for them. We know life happens, and we are glad we could make a difference for the animals and their owners. There are events beyond our control. Hurricane Ian comes to mind. We made a difference for four dogs who flew in from a shelter in Sarasota County, Florida. These dogs were already up for adoption when the storm hit. We made a difference for them and the people in Florida as we helped free up four kennels so the many dogs impacted by Hurricane Ian had a dry and comfortable place to go until things settled down. While it was only four dogs, we know it helped them, the shelter, and the people of their community. We made a difference.

Making a difference and celebrating the nearly 1,000 adoptions, animals returned to their owners, and animals transferred to other agencies also brings smiles to our faces. When you think about it, making a difference feels good. That's why we work in this field.

We know in 2023 we can continue to make a difference. For more animals. For more people. And the future is bright.

## **2022 ANIMALS BY THE NUMBERS**

1,074 Homeless Animals were cared for by RCHS

304 dogs and puppies

694 cats and kittens

76 small animals: rabbits, birds, guinea pigs, ferrets, rats, and others



67 small animals






# **COMMUNITY PROGRAMS**

**SPAY THE MOM** If you are a Rutland County resident, you can bring any mom cat or dog and all their offspring to us at no charge. We will "spay the mom," give her vaccines, and return her to you at no cost.

**FERAL CAT PROGRAM** RCHS assists people who are caring for stray, feral, and other loosely owned cats in Rutland County. We support Rutland County residents who employ TNR (trap, neuter, return) to manage feral cat populations. Young kittens may be adopted into homes and the other healthy cats too wild to be





adopted are returned to their familiar habitat under the lifelong care of volunteers. **COMMUNITY PET FOOD PROGRAM** If pet food is donated to the Shelter that we cannot use, we distribute food and supplies to local food shelves. We are so appreciative of the donations made to the Shelter by our

compassionate community. **HUMANE EDUCATION**Educating our community about humane treatment of animals is important to us. If you have a group of students, scouts, campers, seniors, staff, and more, we would love to

come talk about RCHS. LOST AND FOUND PETS RCHS accepts stray

**ANIMAL SURRENDERS** We accept all owned domestic animals who are surrendered to us by residents of Rutland County without fee or discrimination based on potential

RCHS by their owners. **ANIMAL CRUELTY AND NEGLECT** RCHS proudly works with Rutland County law enforcement on situations involving animal neglect and abuse. RCHS has no law enforcement authority or the resources available to investigate concerns. **HAVE-A-HEART TRAP LOAN PROGRAM** RCHS has a variety of sizes of Have-A-Heart traps which can be loaned to Rutland County residents. We have traps for small animals, traps for cats and fat cats, and three different sized traps for dogs.
